



	: Jesus died in my place.

Redemption

The Greek word for redemption refers to slaves being purchased in the marketplace. In the spiritual sense, all of us were slaves to sin until Jesus purchased us out of the slave market and set us free from sin's bondage. Because he bought and paid for us with his blood, we now belong exclusively to him.

For he has rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son he loves, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

Propitiation

To propitiate is to bring satisfaction or to fulfill a demand or requirement. In heathen circles it was a word that meant "to appease the gods." The biblical sense of the word speaks of that which satisfies the justice of God so that mercy is given.

The picture of propitiation in the Old Testament is the "mercy seat," the cover of the ark of the covenant in first the tabernacle and later the temple. This is the place where blood was sprinkled as an offering for the sins of the people.

He is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not only for ours but also for the sins of the whole world.

-1 John 2:2

This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins.

-1 John 4:10

In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace.

This means that while Jesus' death accomplished all that God intended it to—Jesus said, "It is finished"—we have not experienced all there is to experience of salvation. There is more to look forward to!



Key Personal Perspective

Does someone have to be able to understand all the truths we've discussed today to be saved? No.

To be saved you need to know only three truths:

- 1. I am a sinner.
- 2. Jesus died in my place.
- 3. If I ask God to forgive me for rebelling against him and I trust in Jesus as my Lord, he will save me.

No one can say these three truths are difficult to understand. The truth of our salvation is simple enough for a child to understand, yet deep enough to study the rest of your life and never fully comprehend.

The bottom line question: Have you accepted God's gift of forgiveness for your sin, paid for by Jesus' death on the cross?

- 5. The seven pictures of salvation that we looked at in this study are among the greatest treasures in any of our lives.
 - 1. Substitution: Jesus died in my place.
 - 2. Justification: Jesus made me right with God.
 - 3. Reconciliation: Jesus made peace with God possible.
 - 4. Adoption: Jesus made me a part of God's family.
 - 5. Redemption: Jesus purchased my salvation with his blood.
 - Propitiation: Jesus satisfied God's justice.
 - 7. Forgiveness: Jesus sent my sins away from me.
