A Closer Look

Three of the most important disciplines of growth through which God sanctifies us are:

1. A daily quiet time—in God's Word and prayer

Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.'"

2. A weekly tithe to God

"Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this," says the LORD Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it."

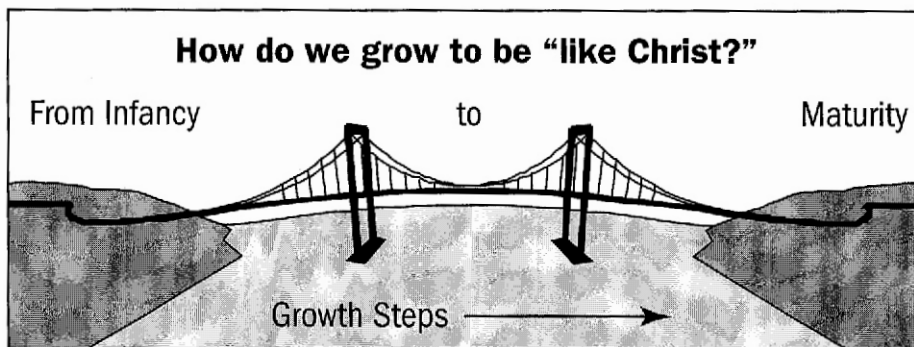
