Satan's Influence: Because Satan _____ Evil

The influence of Satan is a second reason why evil exists in our world today. Evil is not some new creation of Satan—Satan does not have the power to create anything. All he can do is to try to twist or to withhold what God has created.

Is weather evil?

Is ambition evil?

Is sex evil?

Is our ability to talk evil?

All of these are good creations of God. Evil is when Satan twists them into natural disasters, or war, or immorality, or slander.

We as believers need to be able to understand and defeat the enemy without glorifying the enemy. Satan has power, but he is also stupid. (Why else would he have sinned against God?)

Satan: a brief biography

Many of the ideas and pictures of Satan that we grew up with were influenced more by English literature such as Dante's *Inferno* and Milton's *Paradise Lost* than by the Bible. Here we're going to look at the straight story from the Bible about who Satan is.

1. He was an _____ in heaven (Rev. 12:3–9; 9:11).
2. He _____ from heaven due to pride.

And there was war in heaven. Michael and his angels fought against the dragon, and the dragon and his angels fought back. But he was not strong enough, and they lost their place in heaven. The great dragon was hurled down—that ancient serpent called the devil, or Satan, who leads the whole world astray. He was hurled to the earth, and his angels with him.

—Revelation 12:7–9

How you are fallen from heaven, O Lucifer, son of the morning! How you are cut down to the ground—mighty though you were against the nations of the world. For you said to yourself, “I will ascend to heaven and rule the angels. I will take the highest throne. I will preside on the Mount of Assembly far away in the north. I will climb to the highest heavens and be like the Most High.” But instead, you will be brought down to the pit of hell, down to its lowest depths.

3. He has been given _____ freedom to influence the earth.

Satan's limit: he must ask _____.

Some examples:

- Job (Job 1:6–12; 2:1–6)
- Peter: “Satan has asked to sift you as wheat” (Luke 22:31).

4. He is unalterably _____ to eternal destruction.

Satan will be thrown into the lake of fire, to be tormented forever.

And the devil, who deceived them, was thrown into the lake of burning sulfur.

—Revelation 20:10

Mankind's Choice: Because We _____ Evil

Remember two truths:

1. Evil began with _____ (Gen. 3).

The choice that Adam and Eve made to sin had horrible consequences:

- If they ate of the tree they would “surely die.” Sin brings death: spiritual and physical death.

But you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat of it you will surely die.

—Genesis 2:17

- Because they ate from the tree, they were banished from the Garden of Eden. Sin causes us to live in a fallen, imperfect world.

So the LORD God banished him from the Garden of Eden to work the ground from which he had been taken.

—Genesis 3:23

- Adam and Eve passed along to us as their children a sin nature. Sin became a part of all of us when they bit into that fruit. That's why we all inevitably sin. We cannot refuse the temptation of evil.

This is called "original sin." We don't start with a clean slate. We all start with the knowledge of good and of evil and with a flawed heart that causes us to sin.

Therefore, just as sin entered the world through one man, and death through sin, and in this way death came to all men, because all sinned.

—Romans 5:12

2. Evil is present in _____.

It's not just "their fault." We need to be able to admit that "evil is present in me."

When I want to do good, evil is right there with me.

—Romans 7:21

What shall we conclude then? Are we any better? Not at all! We have already made the charge that Jews and Gentiles alike are all under sin. As it is written: "There is no one righteous, not even one; there is no one who understands, no one who seeks God. All have turned away, they have together become worthless; there is no one who does good, not even one."

—Romans 3:9–12

The line separating good and evil passes not through states, nor between classes, nor between political parties—but right through every human heart.¹

The Questions That Remain

Why does God continue to allow evil?

Why doesn't God stop it?

1. He already has defeated evil (1 Cor. 15:57; Col. 2:15).

He defeated evil at the cross and will allow us to join him in that victory for all eternity. We are fighting a battle in which ultimate victory is assured.

God desires for all to be saved (1 Tim. 2:3–4).

And he waits patiently, desiring all to come to salvation (2 Peter 3:9).
